## World War 1, the Kaiser says he "will starve Britain"

At the outbreak of the Great War on 28 July 1914, Britain was importing two thirds of her food from overseas. In order to "starve the British people into submission" it was easy for Kaiser Willhelm II to calculate that sinking food supply shipping would make Britain hungry and weak. By Autumn 1917, millions of tons of meat, sugar, flour and wheat were being sent to the bottom of the seas by the U-boats. So much so, that in The House of Commons it was said that "soon Britain would not be able to feed herself".

Britain's choice was to grow much more food or to starve.

With so many farm labourers at the Front, plus most of the working horses, a new way of manning farms was found and 84,000 disabled soldiers, 30,000 German prisoners of war and over 250,000 women were employed to grow food in the several million acres of land dug up for cultivation. However this still did not provide enough to cover for what was being lost to the U-boats.

Civilians were now the target of war.

It was civilians who were called to save themselves.

The order came from the Government "to plough up Britain" and hand land over to the people, so that they could provide for themselves. In 1917 waste ground was dug up to provide cabbages, potatoes and marrows to feed the nation. Millions of women, the elderly and children began to transform the landscapes. A new craze for "growing your own" swept the country and the press of the day called this craze "allotmentitis".

Before the war, allotments were in the hands of a few "hobbyists" and by the end of the war there were over one and a half million "allotmenteers" squeezed onto any earth that could be dug up. Even the grounds of the Royal Parks and Buckingham Palace were turning out turnips!

So with the introduction of Food Rationing, mass Allotmenteering and guarding of the Merchant Navy supply ships, Britain was able to avoid mass starvation. A legacy of people returning to the land and managing allotments was established, and long may it continue despite the efforts of some to reduce such providers of community and well-being.

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## Harrow Museum Open Day - Saturday March 29th

**What's special about Harrow?** is the name of the Harrow Council Museum Open Day on 29th March 2014 and it's your chance to find out what's happening with the planned upgrades.

Harrow Council is the custodian of the special piece of English history that is Headstone Manor, and has created a plan to enable a sustainable future for Headstone Manor and the Harrow Museum Collection.

This Open Day will run from 10.30 am - 4.00 pm, during which the Council wish to share with Harrow residents the plans for the restoration of Headstone Manor and the creation of the new museum. There will be a free Easter egg trail for children and staff will be on hand to tell you about our 2014 programme. The architects, who are developing the plans for the new museum, will be onsite with drawings of the current proposals for review. It's an ideal opportunity for the public to contribute to the future of the Museum, and ask any questions that you might have about the project.

Harrow Council would also like to hear what you think should be in a museum about Harrow.

## Just Google - "unwanted fruit London"

Does the sight of wasted food bother you? Do you hate to see fruit rotting around trees? If so, then you may wish to consider doing something about it for Harrow.

Our Harrow in LEAF Rep. H Shorter of Greenhill, Central Harrow recently spotted an initiative that someone may be interested in following up on. The umbrella name for this initiative is "Abundance", and is basically a team of volunteers that collect fruits from neglected fruit trees that will go to waste and rot. Abundance counters this waste by picking the fruit and redistributing the surplus to the community on a non-profit basis - to community cafes, nurseries, Surestarts and individuals.

Abundance Harrow is waiting to happen!

## Harrow Council meeting with allotment holders

On Monday Jan 27th 2014 a meeting between Harrow's Allotment Site Reps., Harrow in LEAF Reps. and the Council was held at Harrow Civic Centre. In attendance were the Leader of the Council Susan Hall, chairing the meeting with Dave Corby and Eddie Slavin from Public Realm, Harrow Council.

It was considered a very useful meeting by all parties, as many allotment related topics were discussed including the final version of the new allotment rules for Harrow which are expected to be issued in Summer 2014. The council will are also considering changing the invoicing from "in arrears" to "current year", so look out for details on this in you next bill.

### LEAF Tips:

This year's weather issue was too much water! A real Growing Concern!

One solution discussed in the media is "dredging" and this applies to any drainage ditches or pipes around your own allotments or gardens etc. Make sure that they are kept clear and flowing to ease high water. Report any major blockages to Harrow Council. This year would have shown you the water table on your ground. Why not consider raised beds or plots to protect your soil. As you can see from the attached photo from Cuckoo Hill, clearly the growing area sits above the high water line.
